The **Copenhagen Summer Festival** is approaching!

From **Sunday 28th of July** till **Thursday 8th of August** the city of Copenhagen will host young talents and the elite of awards winners from all over the world. Concerts will be held every day in the beautiful Charlottenborgs Festsal, where the highly profiled young musicians will present classical chamber music pieces.

The young international wind quintet **V Coloris** from European elite music academies will be our guests on the **29th of July**. Founded in 2017, the wind quintet is based in Denmark and Romania. As their name suggests you can expect to hear a combination of cultural nuances in their performance. The quintet will perform "Summer Music op. 31" (1995) by Samuel Barber, "Seks bagateller" (1953) by György Ligeti, "Juego de Ladrones" by Oscar Navarro and "At spille i skoven" (1947) by Jørgen Jersild.

On the **30th of June** the pianist **Ignas Maknickas**, price winner of the Aarhus International Piano Competition 2019, will perform in Copenhagen. Class 1998, he was raised in a musical family and he performs since 2013 together with his siblings in an ensemble. Since September 2017 the pianist has been studying at the Royal Academy of Music in London.

Don't miss the **Messiaen Quartet Copenhagen!** The Østerbro-based chamber music ensemble with piano clarinet, violin and cello will perform on the **6th of August** "Isolde Liebestod" from the opera "Tristan und Isolde" of Richard Wagner and "Quarter for the End of Time" by Oliver Messaen.
